Laser Dental Treatment

DENVER (CBS4) Is a trip to the dentist disturbing? Does just the sound of the drill make you sweat? Then you might want to look into getting a laser treatment.

More and more dentists are offering laser technology for getting rid of tooth decay. It can be used for cavity removal, root canals, biopsies and gum surgeries, but it can't cut through metal so you need conventional drills to remove any silver fillings.

With no need for anesthesia, dentist Dr. Chuck Danna says patients' visits have been shortened by at least 10 minutes.

Danna says laser energized water does all the work.

"We have a water spray coming out of there and the water actually does the cutting for us," Danna said.

The laser never touches the tooth so there is no friction or vibration. The cool water keeps the tooth from heating up, and that eliminates discomfort.

Danna is one of about 65 Colorado dentists using a laser when treating patients. His office is located in Littleton near Ken Caryl.
